Delia Bankhead 1932-2009

It is with much sadness that we announce the loss of our long time member and good friend, Delia Bankhead, who passed away suddenly in her home in Hendersonville, North Carolina in June of this year. Delia joined the WDS in the early 1970's and was a good friend of Pat Crenshaw, Marie Bozievich, and Roberta Watrous from whom she learned to be an excellent grower and exhibitor.

She became an accredited judge in 1984 and later an accredited judging school instructor. She was the recipient of the Middle Atlantic Regional Award for leadership and service. She was chairman of the National ADS convention hosted by WDS in 1988. She won the ADS Silver medal for service to the society in 2000.

She was always interested in nurturing the interest of new members and was very generous with her bulb collection.

She will be remembered for her work as chairman of the ADS miniatures committee from 1996-2004, during which time she searched worldwide for cultivars that were thought to be extinct. She was the primary author of the ADS book on miniatures which is the first of its kind and an extraordinarily useful tool to miniature collectors, exhibitors, and judges.

Upon the death of Roberta Watrous, Delia accepted the challenge to care for Roberta's remaining seedlings and to get them named and distributed. She began her own hybridizing of miniatures in the early 1990's with specific goals that included new miniatures with white perianths and colored cups.

Besides daffodils, Delia grew a host of other tiny plants that included rare lady slippers and trilliums. She had an extensive library of books on a variety of subjects and was a great lover of classical music. She left specific instructions in her will that her standard bulbs be given to her close friends. Her miniatures will be grown by fellow WDS member, Chriss Rainey, who was asked to dig them and care for them until which time those worthy can be named and placed in commerce.

Many letters of condolence were sent to her family from around the world with kind words of friendship and high praise for her accomplishments. Those who knew her well understand that the daffodil world has lost a great mentor, friend, authority, leader, and visionary. She will be greatly missed, but never forgotten.

No Bulb Left Behind By Kate Carney

If you are like most daffodil aficionados, you have collected more and more daffodil bulbs that have now multiplied ten fold, and now you don't know what to do with them all. Am I right? We all share our special ones amongst friends and at fall meetings. But what about those with lost labels, the ones you don't feel are show quality or some you are just plain tired of, the garden center impulse buy ones which are nothing like the picture and could be anything but what you thought you purchased?

Here's an idea that will help you and others. Take those outcast bulbs to your local library, nursing home, hospital or hospice and see if they would be willing to let you plant them in their gardens. Even better is to involve some youth like the Boy or Girl Scouts who need to do community service. What a wonderful project! And it will achieve so many things. The first is to spread our favorite flower to people and places so that others will admire their beauty and maybe bring some happiness and cheer. And by culling your collection you will have space for MORE bulbs and thus start this whole cycle over again!

Fall Daffodil Chores by Kathy Welsh

..... Fall is the time for planting, but before you can plant you need to have your soil prepared and your bulbs sorted.

Preparing the soil: Soil preparation can begin in early September. Soil prep can mean two different things depending on whether you are refurbishing soil that's been used before or preparing a new bed. **Given the opportunity, one of the most important things you can do for daffodil health is to rest your beds and rotate every few years.** Having lived in my current home for over 15 years, I am now seeing substantial basal rot because I haven't let my beds lay dormant. Fusarium is deadly for daffodils and it has a tendency to build up in the soil over time. When installing a new bed, dig approximately 10" deep using a shovel, then use a tiller to break up the dirt. Amend the soil with "Super Fines" or some other soil conditioner, rototilling these in to break up the clay and improve drainage. In recent years I have also used Gran-i-grit. This product is like a very course sand or small gravel. It can be purchased at Southern States. Over time additional amendments and nutrients are needed to improve tired soil. Like Bob Huesmann I have been experimenting with various products which revitalize the soil while fighting fusarium. For more information on this subject, refer to last fall's newsletter.

Planting: Everyone agrees that the soil should be 55 degrees or below before planting begins. In this area that means planting should begin no earlier than the beginning of October, but generally towards the middle of the month. Try to finish your planting by Thanksgiving if possible, but early to mid-December can be OK. Strong root growth before the ground freezes is essential. Plenty of water in the fall means good smooth flowers in the spring. It is important to get minis in the ground first when planting late. Good root growth is even more important for tiny bulbs which are planted closer to the surface than their bigger brothers. Early spring planting is possible if the bulbs are still firm. Soft bulbs should be thrown away. Dig your hole 6-8 inches deep. Place a small amount of 5-10-10 fertilizer in the hole or trench, then cover with an inch of dirt. Fertilizing below the bulb at the time of planting is the most important time to fertilize. It places the nutrients at the roots, where the bulbs are able to absorb them. Don't let the fertilizer touch the bulbs or it will burn them. When it comes to minis use fertilizer sparingly and consider broadcasting over the planted area. One additional step can be taken. I have recently started using a thin layer of Gran-i-grit underneath my bulbs. This helps with drainage and makes the bulbs easier to find when digging.

Labeling: It is important to label and map your bulbs. In fact I use a three pronged approach. In addition to labeling and mapping, I bury a piece of plastic milk carton with the name of the bulb and the color code written with a permanent sharpie. This provides verification when digging and can be kept in the mesh bag after bulbs are out of the ground. Make the map immediately after planting. After planting a mulch of pine bark or pine needles is recommended. Mulch helps to keep your blooms clean, insulates during the winter, and keeps the soil cool during the summer. Once your bulbs are in the ground it's time to breath a sigh of relief, sit back, relax and wait until spring!

Mistakes I have made planting daffodils (What about you?) by Lucy Rhame

I have learned a lot about daffodil growing and showing over the past ten years but, just like all growers, I certainly made mistakes when I embarked on this hobby.

One large miscalculation was when I planted my first bed of white daffodils. I bought a number of fabulous specimens from WDS and thought how nice it would be to plant them together under my kitchen window for a lovely white bed display while labeling them for the spring show season. What a mistake!. I did have a lovely display of W-W's, but somewhere along the line a mix-up occurred and a division 2 with a green eye emerged where a division 1 pure white was meant to be. I could not tell one white from another despite my labels and maps. For me, similar color daffodils should not be planted next to each other in order to avoid identification problems on the show bench.

My first lesson learned. The next one...my dogs and the garden service. Despite precise and time consuming labeling on my planted bulbs, my energetic German Shepherds ran through the beds, pulling up and chewing tags. Add insult to injury, the yard man proceeded to rake the mulched beds upending any remaining identification. It is suggested that a three pronged method of identification is the most effective. In addition to above ground tags, a label written on pieces of plastic milk carton or levelor blind sections with a permanent black marker can be planted in the hole with the bulbs. Finally, a map should be drawn detailing all plantings. You cannot show if you do not know what you grow.

Narcissus Fly – Zero Tolerance—No Excuses! By Bob Huesmann

Some daffodil growers eschew the use of chemicals. For the rest of us, however, there are no excuses for having even one of our treasured bulbs chewed up and made into mush by the grub of a narcissus fly. There are two chemicals now widely available in easy-to-use granular form which will kill any narcissus fly grub which dares to come anywhere near a daffodil bulb. These two grub-zappers are Dylox and Imidacloprid. Each is available in home and garden supply stores, labeled as a "Grub Control" product for lawns. They come packaged by various suppliers, like Scott or Spectracide, but don't pay any attention to that. Just be sure to look for the place on the package where they list the ingredients and make sure it shows Dylox or Imidacloprid as the active ingredient. I believe Dylox and Imidacloprid to be close to 100% effective. (I have not had an infested bulb in 2 or 3 years.) But they ARE different. Dylox is a fast-acting and fast-disappearing chemical, i.e. it breaks down in the soil in a few weeks. The claim on the package is usually something like "works in 24 hours" or something similar. Imidacloprid, on the other hand, remains in the soil for a couple



of months or so. The package usually says something like "season- long control." Personally, I think this gives an advantage to Imidacloprid because one application will remain effective over the critical parts of the life cycle of the fly/egg/larvae/grub; but Dylox, too, is effective at interrupting this life cycle if applied at the right time(s). I suggest applying about a scant tablespoon of granules around the base of each plant sometime in the last two weeks of April, or earlier if you see a fly buzzing around. If you're doing it for the first time, my suggestion would be to apply the stuff closer to April 1. That way you will kill any grubs left over from the year before. Although these holdovers probably have already damaged their host bulbs, uneaten parts of these bulbs sometimes recover and grow. If you use Dylox the first year, consider applying it twice, the first time in late March or early April to zap those holdover grubs and the second around May 1 to eliminate any larvae or grubs that have the audacity to challenge the new system. (Actually, it might make sense to use Imidacloprid for the second application.)

Although my personal preference is to place the granules around the base of each plant, where the flies like to lay their eggs, I see no reason why a broadcast application wouldn't also be effective; it would use more chemical, but would take less time to apply. Note that Imidacloprid is also available in liquid form as an insecticide under the Spectracide brand. I use this in my post-harvest bulb dip, but I think the granular form is probably more effective as a soil treatment. If you don't use chemicals, perhaps not all is lost. My suggestion would be to spray your daffodils (be sure to include the base of each plant) every two weeks or so, beginning mid-March until the end of May, with a product containing neem extract. I don't think neem is lethal, but it may be objectionable enough to give larvae and grubs a severe itch and/or bellyache and encourage most flies to go lay their eggs on somebody else's daffodils. I haven't used neem for this purpose myself, so no guarantees. My guess is that you will reduce-- but not completely eliminate-- damage from those darned narcissus flies.

Fertilizing Daffodils

Chriss Rainey passes this along:

“I've been trying to straighten some files and I came across something in papers of Delia Bankhead's that I thought members might find interesting. She had a typed recipe for Phil Phillip's Planting Fertilizer and a hand written recipe for Foliar Feeding after bloom. I can't vouch for either one personally, but they sure sound like they'd make a daffodil sit up and behave. Chriss” **Let us know if you try them and they work.**



Phil Phillip's Planting Fertilizer

- 1 50 lb bag of green sand
- 1 50 lb bag of Dolomite lime
- 1 25 lb triple phosphate, or 1 50 lb bag double superphosphate
- 1 lb powdered sulfur
- 1 lb borax
- 1/2 lb manganese of sulfate
- 1 lb sulfate of iron
- 1 lb zinc sulfate
- 2 lb Epsom Salts

Tip first three items out on a strong plastic sheet or similar about 5 ft. square or larger. Spread well over the sheet and mix evenly. Then spread the other ingredients evenly over the mix except the manganese sulfate, which you dissolve in about 1/2 gal. hot water about 140 F or thereabouts and sprinkle it evenly over the mix, rake it in and then pull the sheet by the corners so the mix tumbles itself and mixes well. Do this several times. Leave overnight and then pull again until all lumps are broken. The mix can then be bagged and used when required. Use 2/3 cup mix for each row (4feet long) of bulbs working it in well below planting level.

Foliar Feeding Daffodils

To 1 gallon of water add:

- 2 tablespoons variegated violet (Peters)
- 1 tablespoon Epsom salts
- 1 teaspoon liquid seaweed
- 1 teaspoon liquid iron
- 1 tablespoon Diazanone or Dursban
- 1 teaspoon dishwashing detergent
- 1 teaspoon trace elements (Peters)

Spray to wet all sides of foliage. Do not spray within 4 hours of rain.
 Spray every 7-10 days after flowering until senescence begins (in the foliage, not the person)
 If a trace element mix is available this may be added every other time at rate of 1 teaspoon per gallon.
 Fill to just above the line on green sprayer. * Virginia P's recipe incl. 1 "measure" sulphate of potash.

Membership Renewals Due January 1, 2010

Washington Daffodil Society Summer Board Meeting

Summit Point, West Virginia

June 13, 2009

The meeting was called to order at 11:00 am by President Lucy Rhames at the new home of Mary Koonce. Board Members present included Lucy Rhame, Spencer Rainey, Lina Burton, Mary Anne Barton, Mary Koonce, Tom Taylor, Glenna Graves, Dorothy Sensibaugh, Kathy Welsh, Tricia Goins, Robert Darling, Mary Semrad, and Linda Smith.

Board Meeting Reports:

- The secretary's report was previously published in the newsletter and was accepted by voice vote.
- Treasurer Tricia Goins gave a report of the status of WDS funds and they were accepted by voice vote.
- President Rhame reported that the Spring luncheon and meeting would be at the Italian Cafe, 7161 Lee Highway, in Falls Church, Virginia on February 27, 2010.
- Mary Koonce reported that this year's bulb order amounted to about \$14,000, and that she will continue to accept orders until the suppliers ship the bulbs.
- Kathy Welsh reported that the membership consists of 225 members and 22 garden clubs.
- Nominating Committee Chair Kathy Welsh and members Tom Taylor and Mitch Carney proposed a slate of new Board members:
 - Lucy Rhame for President
 - Glenna Graves for Vice-President
 - Donna Clausen to replace Holly Ruffin (who will remain on the Board as Secretary) with the term to expire 2010
 - Robert Huesmann to replace Tricia Goins (who will remain on the Board as Treasurer) with term to expire 2011
 - Lina Burton, Carol Kennedy, Jim Taylor, and Suzanne Worsham for board members with terms expiring in 2012
- Mary Koonce and Dorothy Sensibaugh will work with Brookside Gardens to coordinate their daffodil plantings.
- Deadline for Fall newsletter will be September 1, 2009. A total of 249 recipients get the newsletter--129 get it in hard copy.
- President Rhame announced the Chriss and Spencer Rainey will assume responsibility for storing the WDS properties at Merrifield Gardens.
- Robert Darling announced that he would like volunteers to help him identify and reorganize the daffodil collections at the National Arboretum next season.
- Delia Bankhead died May 24, 2009. She did not want a lot of "fuss", but the membership wanted to do something in her memory. Chriss Rainey has been helping with her estate and may have some suggestions.

New Board Business:

- Mary Koonce moved and Linda Smith seconded to establish three \$100 grants to promote daffodils in the landscape. Discussion followed and the motion was withdrawn with the understanding that the will of the Board was to support public plantings and that detailed procedures would be established.
- Kathy Welsh moved that Section 4.02 of the Bylaws be amended to increase the number on the Board as Follows: (underlining indicates the proposed changes)
 - The full board of Directors shall consist of four (4) officers (President, Vice President, Secretary, and Treasurer); twelve (12) elected directors; the Newsletter Editor; the Webmaster; The Show Chairs of all WDS shows; the Bulb Order Chairman; the membership Chairman; and the immediate past President who shall become a Director upon the expiration of his/her term and shall serve until his/her successor's term expires. Other committee Chairs may be appointed to the Board at the discretion of the President.
 - This amendment will be voted upon at the fall meeting. The Board Meeting adjourned at 1:00 pm.

Membership Meeting:

- Following the Board meeting the membership convened in a large tent on the lawn to enjoy a picnic lunch. Members brought dishes and the WDS provide fried chicken.
- President Rhame summarized the actions and announcements of the Board meeting for the general membership.
- The membership thanked Mary Koonce and her family for the fine hospitality shown them.
- A short program was given on digging, dipping and the hot water treatment of bulbs. Glenna Graves served as the moderator
- A plant exchange was conducted by drawing and everyone went home with plants.
- At 3:30, before going home, those members that were interested traveled to an historic neighboring home that is still owned by a descendant of George Washington and enjoyed a very informative tour by the owner.
